

Conference Speakers

Oliver Sacks, MD, is a world-renowned neurologist,



humanist and best-selling author. In his previous books and publications, Dr. Sacks has offered case histories of some of his most fascinating patients, and now, in *Uncle*

Tungsten, he shares a personal voyage back to his childhood in wartime London . He reveals his boyhood love of chemistry as the source of his lifelong scientific curiosity. Sacks celebrates the humanity of those whose minds are imprisoned by a different consciousness and applauds "the freedom and potential of the human spirit against a physiological fate." He is a member of the faculty at New York University Medical Center and the Albert Einstein College of Medicine.

Lucy Daniels, PhD, is a psychologist, writer and



mother committed to helping others restore their creativity through psychoanalytic treatment. She is the founder and board chair of the Lucy Daniels Foundation and founder of the

Lucy Daniels Center for Early Childhood. A clinical psychologist with a private practice in Raleigh, North Carolina, Dr. Daniels is a fiction writer, who has recently completed her most intimate project to date— her personal memoir, entitled, *With A Woman's Voice*. Her first novel, *Caleb my Son*, was published in 1956 and won Daniels a Guggenheim Fellowship in Literature. Dr. Daniels is currently writing a new novel.

Louise Glück has won the Pulitzer Prize, the



National Book Critics Circle Award, the William Carlos Williams Award, the Bobbitt National Poetry Prize, the Ambassador's Award, and the Bollingen Prize for her poetry,

as well as the PEN/Martha Albrand Award for Nonfiction. Her book *Vita Nova* won the first annual New Yorker Readers Award. Louise Glück teaches at Williams College and lives in Cambridge, Massachusetts.

Ellen Handler Spitz, PhD is Professor of Art History




and Theory in the Department of Visual Arts and the Honors College at the University of Maryland, Baltimore County. Her specialty is psychological interpretation in the visual,

literary, and performing arts. She is the author of Art and Psyche, Image and Insight, Museums of the Mind, and Inside Picture Books. Her work has been translated into Italian and Japanese and she lectures internationally. She has held fellowships at



the Getty Center for the History of Art and the Humanities, the Radcliffe Institute, the Center for Advanced Study at Stanford, and the Camargo Foundation in southern France.


Gilbert J. Rose, MD is a psychiatrist and psychoan-



alyst in private practice since 1955, and a member of the Muriel Gardiner Program for Psychoanalysis and the Humanities at Yale University. He is the recipient of the

Founders' Distinguished Teaching Prize for 2001-02 from the Western New England Psychoanalytic Society. A member of the faculty of Yale University Medical School's, Department of Psychiatry for 25 years, Dr. Rose is the author of *The Power of Form: A Psychoanalytic Approach to Aesthetic Form, Trauma and Mastery in Life and Art, and Necessary Illusion: Art As Witness.* Dr. Rose serves on the Advisory Council of the Lucy Daniels Foundation.

Donald J. Rosenblitt, MD is the founding clinical



director of the Lucy Daniels Center for Early Childhood, established in1989. He is currently the Director of the UNC-Duke Psychoanalytic Education Program, where he

also serves as training and supervising analyst in Adult and Child Psychoanalysis. Dr. Rosenblitt has served as an officer in numerous national professional organizations including: chairman of the Board on Professional Standards of the American Psychoanalytic Association (1997-2000); co-chairman of the Workshop on Therapeutic Preschools of the American Psychoanalytic Association (1999-present); and currently as secretary-elect of the Association of Child Psychoanalysis.

Lynn Reiser, MD enjoys dual careers as a psychia-



trist and an internationally known author and illustrator of children's books. Her work as psychiatrist and psychoanalyst often involves helping patients discover and express

their own "stories" and guiding them as they "fit those stories together to make more sense of their lives." Her own stories are warm and robust, enlivened by what one reviewer has called "wild and woolly artwork." A graduate of Duke University and Yale Medical School, Dr. Reiser completed her psychoanalytic training at the Western New England Institute for Psychoanalysis where she has served on the board of trustees since 1993. Her children's books have received praised from critics nationwide and numerous awards including the Child Study Children's Book Committee List of "Children's Books of the Year, 1991" and a Parents Choice Award in 1992.
